My work with my partner during our peer review session was a major part in the start of our portfolio assignment. Having someone else read my work helped me get a sense of whether or not I began to accomplish what I have envisioned in my attempt. Since information is always communicated with a certain audience in mind, having a member of that audience to read it before it was completed was the perfect way to make sure my ideas were communicated through my portfolio.
