- Ethnography (observations of a group or group in an attempt to understand it or them from the perspective of the observed)

 - Adrienne Kennedy illustrates the complexities and complications of multiracial people.
 - 1960: Americans could choose their own race...frequently identify with minority group contrary to Sarah in Funnyhouse of a Negro who tries to mask her African American identity.
 - 1970: guided to identify with race they feel most connected to
 - 2000: Americans may identify with more than one race
 - Progression of the country in accepting, acknowledging and guiding those of multiracial descent.
 - Consensus have shown an increase in race identification getting more specific as the years go on.
 - 1790 only consist of free whites, all other free personas and slaves
 - 1850: Mulatto
 - 2010: 63 possible race categories
 - 6 for single races and 57 for combined...9million people chose more than one racial category
- Oral History (personal interviews given in person on a pre-determined topic)

- Adrienne Kennedy Interview from Rose Library (Disc 1 & 2)
- Social issues: NAACP, Paul Robeson
- Kennedy's childhood: much diversity
 - Faced less racism in high school than elementary school but, was able to deal with it regardless because it was "out in the open"
- Her town in Cleveland had tight-knit black community
- Faced much racism at Ohio State University
 - Segregated dorms; first experience of extreme rage of white women
 - Stayed at school despite her anger and the racist remarks because her childhood friends were all there thus feeling a connection
- Funnyhouse of a Negro was initially not viewed highly; received much criticism to the extent that the Black community felt it to be Anti-Black though she tried to illustrate an honest perspective of her experiences including the "crazy hair" of Billie Allan.
